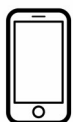
Contentment

At our beginning of term assembly, I spoke with our students about one of the most dangerous sins we can fall into – complaining and grumbling. On the surface, this doesn't seem such a terrible activity. In fact, many of us can get quite a bit of enjoyment out of a decent whinge session. But a Christian perspective on this is helpful.

Contentment is an attitude that says, "I will be satisfied with what God has given me."

A great narrative that highlights how seriously God views



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the ingratitude that grumbling and complaining represents is found in the book of Numbers where God's people are on the edge of the Promised Land. God had rescued them miraculously from slavery in Egypt, performing 10 great signs or plagues. He made a way through the Red Sea for them but drowned the Egyptian warriors chasing them. He fed them with manna from heaven, and water from the rock. All through the wilderness wanderings, the people of God grumbled and complained despite all these miraculous examples of God's love and care for them.

The final straw was when the Israelites sent 12 spies into the land that God had promised them, to scope it out. The spies came back with a mixed report. The land God promised them was a fertile land that was full of milk and honey, and the spies brought back a bunch of grapes which was so big that it was carried on a pole between two men. But 10 of the spies sowed discontent and doubt amongst the people of Israel. The people in the Promised Land were too big, their cities were too well-protected. There was no way they could take this land. And so once again the people complained and grumbled. They even wished they were back in Egypt where they were slaves and wished they had died in the desert. God granted that wish and sentenced them to die in the wilderness.

This narrative reminds us once again of our 2024 school virtue – gratitude. The

people of Israel forgot all the good things God had done for them. Discontent is like a poison. It ruins our lives and turns us into people who are not very fun to be around. But more than that, it can poison our relationship with our Creator. Grumbling and complaining is not just a small matter – it's a rejection of God and his providence. It's saying to God, that his way of running the universe stinks, and we think he could be doing a better job. As parents, one of the most important



things we can teach our children is contentment. Whining and complaining are not minor issues in the life of a toddler or child. They are serious errors that need to be corrected. No child should be left to whine without correction, for a child who is never disciplined for complaining and grumbling is set on a bitter path away from God and his blessing. Paul teaches us that godliness with contentment is great gain.

If you are a follower of Jesus Christ, you have been given enormous riches – an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade in the salvation that has been won by Christ and received through faith. Look for opportunities in your home to remind your children of

all the good things God has given them and teach them the importance of being thankful and content with the blessings God has given them.

How We Ought to Think about Our Children

In talking with parents over the years, I've found that almost without fail, there are high expectations for their children's education. This is good and right. We should want our children to excel. But at times, we let worldly prestige inform our plans for them. When I ask parents what they would like to see their child studying after school, I invariably get one of these answers:- doctor, something in the medical field or engineer.

Why do we want this for our children? Sometimes it's because we legitimately think that God has made them in such a way that these fields would be fulfilling and offer them a chance to use their God given gifts in serving the world. But often there are less noble motives. Sometimes we are interested in the prestige that our children will have in their career, and perhaps the reflection that prestige will have on us. There is after all a hierarchy in the world in the ways that vocations are thought of. Sometimes we are concerned about the money our child can make.



There is an element of validity to these concerns, but it is important that we consider the way our children have been made by God. Not all children should be doctors or engineers. Some should be plumbers, some should be mechanics, others hairdressers, some should be salespeople and others chefs. Expecting all our children to fit into a particular mould could be working against the grain of the person God has made them. The key things to think about for the Christian is what is God calling me to do? Help your child think through the following questions as you and they consider a future vocation.

- What does it mean to be made as a male or a female in the image of God? What is God calling me to be and do as a man or a woman?
- What skills and abilities has God given me?
- What do I enjoy doing?
- How can I serve others as I engage in work?
- Where are some good opportunities to serve God and his kingdom?

Family First



On the last day of Term 2, Mr Aloiai and I attended the Family First organised Forum on the Family. It was a great opportunity to meet with like minded people and hear excellent speakers on conservative issues. One of the highlights was Bob McCoskrie's interview of Jonathan Haidt, a social psychologist at New York University's Stern School of Business. Haidt has recently published a book called *The Anxious Generation: How the Great Rewiring of Childhood is Causing an Epidemic of Mental Illness*. The interview explores how social media has led to a decline in teen mental health, and considers ways we as parents can protect our children. 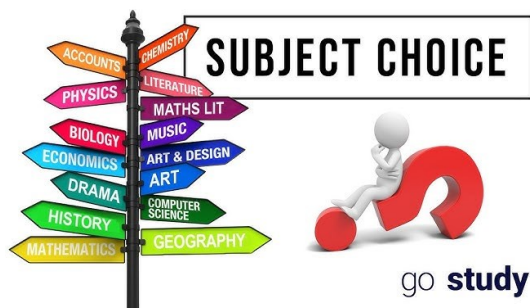
Health and Safety

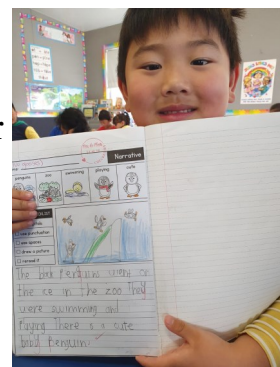
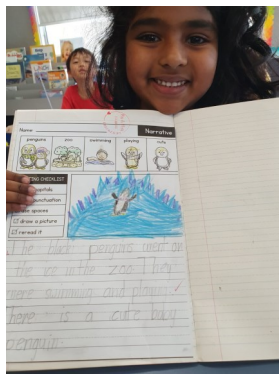
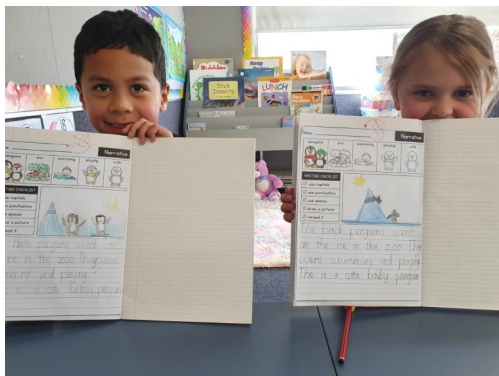

Year 1—Handwriting and Reading

Year 1 students have learnt to write very neatly and enhance their story with beautiful diagrams. Excellent work!



Reading aloud is very important as this leads to a better understanding of what they are reading. Students must pay close attention to every word on the page. Reading aloud makes it easier for students to remember words than if they read them silently.

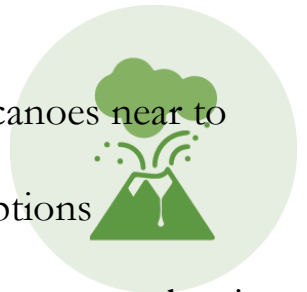


HAPPENINGS

Years 3 to 6—Volcanoes

On Friday 26 July, Auckland War Memorial Museum visited MCS. The Year 3 to 6 students were immersed in the wonderful world of volcanoes. Some concepts that we learnt about included:

- describing Auckland's volcanic field and identifying volcanoes near to our school
- making comparisons of different types of volcanic eruptions
- identifying different types of volcanic rock
- gaining an understanding of the preparation and response to a volcanic eruption or natural disaster

Year 3—Art

Students in Year 3 learnt the skill of blending. Their sunrises and sunsets are a sight to behold and they have captured the breathtaking beauty of God's creation.

Year 6—Science

In science the Year 6 students have been learning about circuits and the components that make up circuits. After learning about 'series circuits' students had the opportunity to create their own circuits in groups. They were able to see how, as more lamps were added to the series circuit, the dimmer their light became. It was great to have the hands-on activity to demonstrate the theory learnt in class.



Year 8—Science

Magnetism is a favourite topic for Year 8 students—especially the practical applications and experiments!

Students learnt that a magnetic field is the invisible area around a magnet that attracts or repels other magnets and magnetic materials such as iron. All magnets have a north pole and a south pole. The north pole of one magnet always attracts the south pole of another. They also learnt to describe the properties of magnets and recognise and reproduce the magnetic field pattern of a magnet. Thank you Mrs Everitt for these very interesting lessons.

Year 6: Jovel Ong—3rd

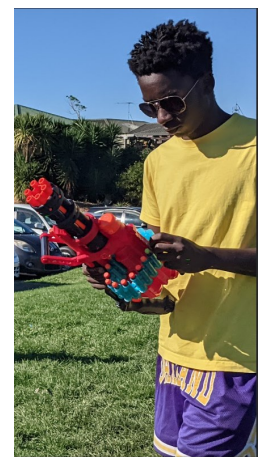
