From the Principal's Desk

These verses show us two things: first, that God has created His people for good works; and second, that Scripture equips us to live them out.

But what exactly are these "good works"?

Too often, Christians read these passages and immediately think of things like preaching, evangelism, or reading the Bible. But Paul doesn't limit "good works" to these so-called spiritual activities. The good work of raising children, changing nappies, managing a household, repairing a car, teaching a class, or writing software—all these are included when done in faith and for the service of others. Scripture equips us not just to be better churchgoers, but better builders, bakers, mothers, and mechanics.

Much of modern Christianity still carries the assumption that full-time Christian ministry is God's preferred path, and that other callings are merely secular or second-tier. But this is a distortion. It reflects a leftover medieval mindset, where the "serious spiritual Christians" were celibate monks, nuns, priests, or hermits—while ordinary vocations were considered spiritually inferior.

The Reformers rejected this false dichotomy. Martin Luther emphasized that all legitimate callings are holy when done in faith. He famously said that God milks the cows through the vocation of the milkmaid. In other words, every good and faithful task performed by men and women is one of the ordinary means by which God expresses His providential care for the world.

All applicants will sit an entrance test, and entry decisions are based on a range of factors including academic readiness, attendance, behaviour, and alignment with our Christian vision.



We warmly invite all interested families to our Year 9 Information Evening to be held in the church on **Thursday 5th June at 7:00pm**. Light refreshments will be served, and we hope to have a few MCS alumni share about the benefits of their high school experience.

Help Please!

Please help us keep our students safe. Please help us prevent gridlock around the carpark when getting in to and out of the school grounds. If you ask a family friend or grandparent to collect your child at the end of the day, **please make sure** they understand our carpark rules for afternoon collections.

- Carparks are for parents of **Year 1-3 only**. Display your parking token when you enter the carpark in the afternoons.
- If your youngest child is in Year 4 and up, park on the road and walk in.
- There is a **one way** traffic layout; DO NOT drive against the direction arrows.
- If no space is available, DON'T stop. Drive OUT of school, and come in at the gate again.
- Please mind your speed, especially in the high school carpark by the preschool. We have received complaints of vehicles speeding in and out of our carparks. Please help us keep all children safe.
- Please remember that accessible (mobility) carparks are for users with mobility cards only. If you park in the mobility carpark, please display your card. These carparks are vital for parents who have limited mobility and students who need to park close to the steps and have extra space for equipment.




- We are still collecting stickers from Yummy Fruits. The school gets sports gear for students from this collection.
