June Series Cambridge Exams

Year 11 students have been following a very full program, and by sitting their English and Mathematics exams in June, they were able to ease the pressure of having six external Cambridge exams at the end of the year. The results were impressive, with **10 out of 15 students** earning either an A* (90% or higher) or an A (80% or higher) in English. The remaining students achieved B grades, showing strong overall performance. In Mathematics **27% of students** attained an A or A* grade. Well done Year 11 students. Once the Year 11 students complete their end-of-year IGCSE exams, they will be in a position to select their preferred subjects for further study.


Year 5—Art Blocks
