Dear MCS Friends and Families,

Welcome to Term 4.

In our last newsletter, our generational vision was emphasised. Manukau Christian School seeks long-term generational fruit through an unwavering commitment to our Reformed Christian heritage, the academic and theological excellence of our students, the quality and faithfulness of our staff, the full support of our parent community, and the lasting cultural impact our graduates will have. Ultimately, we trust in God's sovereignty as we seek to advance His kingdom through Christian education.

As we kicked off Term 4 in the primary school, we met for an Assembly where we looked at the fifth commandment and discussed how it related to our character goal for this year – that of gratitude. In Exodus 20:12, we find the fifth commandment: 'Honour your father and your mother, that your days may be long in the land that the Lord your God is giving you.'

But how does this commandment connect to our character goal of gratitude?

Honouring our father and mother flows from a heart of gratitude for all they have done for us, most importantly giving us life. It is unnatural and sinful for a child to show ingratitude towards his parents. The Reformers saw that this commandment should be applied not only to biological parents, but to forefathers — to those who came before us. It is unnatural and sinful to be ungrateful for those who have built what we enjoy today.

So as a school, we not only look forward in faith, but we look back in gratitude, first of all for what God has done, but also in gratitude to those He has used in our school's history. This list is not exhaustive, but



contains some of the key figures who contributed to Manukau Christian School's existence and flourishing in its early years.







Mrs Kay Coulthard was our foundation teacher. She started in 1987 with a class of twelve students ranging from 4 years old through to Intermediate age. Considerable financial sacrifices were made, yet Mrs Coulthard cheerfully served her students and their parents and was a favourite teacher for many past students of our school. She continued faithfully working amongst us until 2012. Her versatility was shown in her ability to manage a year 1 class through to teaching in our junior high school. Her knowledge and ability to capture students' interest in History, Bible and Geography were exceptional.

Mr Ross Thompson was the minister of St Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Manurewa. Despite opposition amongst his elder board to the concept of a Christian school, Ross was a firm believer and supporter of the school and was integral to seeing it get off the ground.

Mrs Julie St George had a son who was a foundation student and she was our

second ever teacher. She joined Kay Coulthard in 1989 and taught the senior primary students. Julie had a love for music and was a key person in organising Thanksgiving productions for many years in the school. Julie's versatility was seen in the way she managed multi-level classes for many years.

In 1993, Julie stepped down for a year to allow Mr Shane Kennedy to teach senior primary. Shane was the founding principal of St Andrew's Christian School, serving in a voluntary capacity as principal while working at a public Intermediate school. He did a full day's work at his school, and after school did the administration and paperwork for the Christian school. His educational expertise was invaluable as the school

was being set up, and when he joined the school in a paid capacity, and despite only having primary training, he spearheaded a drive for the formation of our first high school: a junior high school that commenced in 1994. Shane remained as principal until 2017, and has continued to teach Psychology in a part-time capacity to our senior high school students.

Mrs Cherry Peek's two children were foundation students, and she, along with her husband Mr Rod Peek were active supporters of the school from its inception. Cherry joined the teaching team as our fourth teacher. She began as an intermediate teacher and later taught a variety of levels in senior primary. She served in the school from 1995 to 2012, and remains a reliever and Mr Shane Kennedy reading to a exam invigilator to this day.

Mrs Shirley Smith was a Board member and one of the parents on the original committee that set up St Andrews Christian School (now Manukau Christian School). She joined the teaching team when an emergency left our intermediate class without a teacher at the end of Term 1 in 2005, and taught amongst us until 2017. She became a beloved intermediate teacher. Shirley was responsible for putting together our school's Bible programme, and was known for her wisdom in dealing with children. She had a great understanding of working with boys. Her daughter Janina has also taught at our school.





In addition to these teachers, we are grateful to the founding families: Hunter, Kennedy, Little, McKenzie, Melville-Smith, Peek, Ready, St-George and Wilson families. Culturally, to reject the public system in favour of an untested Christian school with very little money and next to no resources, was courageous and a real sacrifice. The principal of one of the local schools that these students were being removed from called parents in to tell them Mrs Shirley Smith, Mrs Cherry Peek they were making a mistake! These founding families had to volunteer as

parent-helps, supervising play time and

making resources for the fledgling school. As a founding student however, I look back fondly on those days - even the fact that we had to use a plastic two litre bottle as a bat for PE!

All these teachers sacrificed significantly for the school. In those early days, salaries were far below what public system teachers earned, yet these servant -hearted individuals saw the vision of Christian education important than material as more advantage. To tell all the stories of those who sacrificed their time and finances for the school's success would take many newsletters, but we remain deeply grateful for every pioneer. May we carry forward this same sacrificial spirit, striving to pass on an even better school to future generations.




# Year 7 Perspective

Our Year 7 students have been working on perspective art, featuring a lizard peering through a window or door from across the room, showcasing their developing skills in depth and dimension.











# High School

We recently received results from the 2024 RACI International Chemistry Quiz that students in the high school sat. The Royal Australian Chemical Institute hosts an annual quiz that serves as an opportunity for teachers to gauge their students' understanding of chemistry and acts as a platform to encourage students to pursue studies and careers in chemistry.
